Reading Aloud

March is a great month for reading out loud to your child. It's easy, just start with a book!

- Find a cozy and comfortable place.
- Let your child choose what to read.
- Read the same book many times before?
 Let your child re-tell the story.
- Slow down when you're reading aloud.
 It takes children time to process.
- Talk about the pictures.
- Make predictions about what happens next.
- Include wordless books. Use the pictures to invent your own story.
- Ask and answer questions about the story.
- It's OK not to finish the book.
- Make story time a favorite part of your daily routine.

The happier we'll be.




