Word Games On-the-Go

As parents, we are often on a long drive or waiting in a doctor's office with our children. These simple word games can help pass the time while building your child's letter awareness and increasing their attention span. The games are easy to play and make learning fun.

I Spy – Give this classic game a twist by looking for items that all begin with the same phonetic sound. "I spy with my little eye something that starts with the letter B." If needed, give a hint: "It starts with the B sound and you can read it."

Family Names – It is silly fun to change names so they all start with the same letter sound. Example: "Let's change everyone's name to start with the S sound, so Mommy becomes Sommy, and Grandma becomes Sandma." Include siblings, aunts, uncles, cousins, and friends. When you run out of names, simply change the beginning letter.

Categories – Play this easy categorization game by starting each sentence with the words: "I'm thinking of..." Choose items they're very familiar with such as kinds of fruit or things that are red. Take turns naming as many items as possible. Options are plentiful so quickly change the category when ideas start to run out. Other options include kinds of balls, favorite toys, animals at the zoo, and things that go.


