#### **Trucks & Cars**

Cars and trucks stimulate children's senses: wheels spin, lights blink, horns honk, engines rev, and they move in a variety of directions. Small cars and trucks are the perfect cause-and-effect toy, engaging kids' imagination and encouraging their creativity. Try these activities to extend their play.

- Build ramps Cardboard boxes, ironing boards, books, and blocks can all be employed to put gravity in action so cars and trucks can gain speed and roll down the ramp.
- Make a parking lot Use colored paper that corresponds with the color of your toy cars. Draw lines to create parking spaces, for a fun sorting and matching activity.
- Hauling trucks Provide a variety of small items that can be hauled around in toy trucks.
   Include items like miniature marshmallows, pretzel sticks, and small crackers.
- Car wash Use two plastic wash tubs to create
  a car wash. Fill one tub with soapy water or shaving
  cream and another tub with clean water for rinsing.
- Create roads Tape bubble wrap to a floor, creating a bumpy road for cars to drive over. Draw a chalk maze and see if your child can determine how to drive their car out of the twists and turns.




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
